# "Changes"

"Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." (Hebrews 13:8)

There is that old saying that goes, "the more things change, the more they stay the same." (Actually I have found that it is an old French Proverb, but that is probably more information than you need to know. I took French in High School and College, but all I remember besides 'bonjour' and 'au revoir' is 'I don't understand you.' Gervais LeBlanc would certainly have difficulty understanding any of my French.) Nevertheless, while I am not too sure about that saying and its origin, I do know that things change and that we are most comfortable when things stay the same. Maybe you have heard that joke, "How many Lutherans does it take to change a light bulb? None, Lutherans don't change." But we do!

As we do our day to day duties and as we interact in our daily relationships it is not easy to see the progression of change. Looking at ourselves in the mirror every day doesn't allow us to see how we are changing over time until we pull out the old pictures and are confronted by the changes. In that case the change is the fact that we are getting older, not to mention that we are left scratching our heads wondering why we would ever be seen wearing some of the things that we wore in those pictures. So you see, we are aware of the changes that we have in our lives because appearances and styles change, but so do some of our routines and even some of our needs.

Every year at this time things change here on Hillcrest and we are reminded between 7:30 and 8:00 in the morning and 3:00 and 3:30 in the afternoon that school is once again in session as the girls at Mount St. Mary either drive themselves in to school or are brought in and picked up by their parents. Traffic up here at those times is problematic. This time of year our children go through a change from summer vacation to another year at school. In hindsight there were many changes in the years I went to school and it is no different today. There is more to learn today and more ways to access information needed for learning. I would imagine that none of our children have the responsibility of taking out the board erasers and beating the chalk out of them. Fads come and go and each year our children need to figure out a new set of teachers and their requirements, not to mention new fashions and new friends. Some of our young people have moved on to college which means a different kind of change in their homes. Parents are left to wonder how that happens so quickly!

The more time that we have in our pasts magnifies the changes that confront us. There are many points of comparison that reflect those changes. Thankfully the writer to the Hebrews pointed out that one of the divine attributes of Jesus is that He stays the same and will continue to do so. We can count on that. There is a sense of constancy there even as we deal with all of the changes we encounter in life.

Of course change is not always a bad thing. Changes can be real blessings for us. Think about the changes we have all been witnesses to as it relates to the technologies that help and support us in our day to day living. My Grandmother Walter once shared with me how she had witnessed so much change during her lifetime. She pointed out that the one change that seemed to impact her life the most was refrigeration. We take that for granted, don't we? What would we have done this summer without it and without air-conditioning? My Grandmother and Grandfather Walter never lived in an air-conditioned house and it did get hot in Ohio, but they were just used to that. This past August 1<sup>st</sup> also saw a change in my schedule as I did not go home to Paducah to be with my father to celebrate his birthday. That is a significant change in my life, even as Paula and I look forward to having another granddaughter the first part of November.

Over time there are always changes in the life of a congregation. Families come and they go. Some of our young people fail to return to Grace to be strengthened in their faith and

life as a Christian. Some of them move on to live in other places where they thankfully join another congregation. Dear and faithful members go to receive the goal of their faith. That too has been magnified in my life the longer I am here at Grace. Allen Deislinger was a faithful member of this congregation and we said goodbye to him the later part of August. Such is the movement of this life, but I know from God's Word that there is also everlasting life and I get to share that with God's people here at Grace week in and week out. When Paula and I came to Little Rock in late January of 1995 to visit after receiving the Call to serve as Pastor here, Allen and Dorris were the first people we met and we had dinner with them. There was not anything Allen wouldn't do for me while he was able. He was like a father to me in Little Rock. So saying goodbye to a dear and faithful member is not an easy thing for me to do. But in doing so I get to share the Gospel about what Jesus has done for us and that truth will never change.

The writer of the letter to the Hebrews reminds us that among the manifold changes of this life there is one constant that doesn't change, our Lord Jesus Christ. Certainly the need we have for His grace and mercy does not change either, nor does our need to give Him our thanks and praise, the glory due His name because He does not change. We can also rejoice that through the Gospel the Holy Spirit has changed us. We have been changed from His enemies to His redeemed and forgiven people. The Gospel clearly shares with us this fact: "For if while we were enemies we were reconciled to God by the death of His Son, much more, now that we are reconciled, shall we be saved by His life. More than that, we also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation." (Romans 5:10-11)

The cross and the empty tomb give us a picture of God's great love for us, and that will never change!

# "Lutheran Hymnody in America: Part 4"

Greetings in Christ!

At the beginning of this month, we held the Music Kickoff to begin another wonderful year of music at Grace! I am thankful to all who attended and helped out, and I am looking forward to beginning choir and handbell rehearsals next week! In last month's article, we ended by hearing about the movement to a more confessional (returning to original texts and melodies) hymnody in the nineteenth century. As the twentieth century arrived, it brought with both a movement towards the English language and consolidation among the many Lutheran denominations.

With the resurgence of unaltered texts and melodies of the Reformation, a new struggle was found in translating these hymns to English. Much discussion over this was held, and many were concerned chiefly with literary quality. Early attempts at translation often left plenty to be desired (some criticized inelegant texts and "rhymed dogma"), though these attempts set the stage for further work. Three hymnals, *Lutheran Hymnary* (1912), the *Evangelical Lutheran Hymn-Book* (1913) and *The Lutheran Hymnal* (1941), are prime examples of early attempts at translating Norwegian and German hymns.

We also find evidence of consolidation in early twentieth-century hymnals. For a few examples, *Lutheran Hymnary* brought together Norwegian groups; the *American Lutheran Hymnal* (1931) brought together the Iowa, Ohio, and Buffalo Synods; and *The Lutheran Hymnal* brought together the Synodical Conference, which included the Missouri Synod. In the 1950s, eight Lutheran church bodies participated in creating the *Service Book and Hymnal* (1958). Most of these hymnals "involved bringing together groups of similar ethnic origins or compatible theological viewpoints."

While English became the language of worship and hymnody among Lutherans in America, additional concerns were brought forward, including concerns for cultural factors and additional hymns for Baptism and Holy Communion. The Missouri Synod in 1966 sent an invitation to other Lutheran church bodies to form the Inter-Lutheran Commission on Worship (ILCW), and the Synod shared materials it had prepared in connection with a revision of *The Lutheran Hymnal*. This material was published in 1969 as *Worship Supplement*.

By 1977, the ILCW had authorized the new hymnal, *Lutheran Book of Worship* (LBW), which had already been approved by the American Lutheran Church and Lutheran Church in America. However, the church body that initiated the new hymnal project had not yet given its approval. Through the late 1960s and 1970s, the Missouri Synod had seen the election of a more theologically conservative leadership, which resulted in the 1977 Synod Convention appointing a committee to study *Lutheran Book of Worship*, which was ultimately published in 1978. The committee recommended revising LBW, and the revised hymnal was published in 1982 as *Lutheran Worship*. When placing the two hymnals side by side, it is clear that they are closely related both in hymnody and liturgical music (both hymnals were the first to include what we know as Divine Services One and Two).

Schalk writes that Muhlenberg's dream of one hymnal for all American Lutherans was "shattered," though we see in these events the clear differing paths taken among Lutherans in America. The denominations that adopted *Lutheran Book of Worship* merged to form the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, which published its current hymnal, *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, in 2006. The Missouri Synod for years struggled to find consolidation among its congregations when it came to hymnals, as many opted to retain *The Lutheran Hymnal* as opposed to *Lutheran Worship*. After years of preparation, the Missouri Synod published *Lutheran Service Book* in 2006, which retained the best of the 1941 and 1982 hymnals, while including many new liturgical settings and hymns.

While the story of American Lutheran Hymnody is one of consolidation followed by diverging paths, we rejoice that this rich heritage of hymnody has been passed down to us! Though there are multiple hymnals in use among Lutherans and Christians in our country, we are reminded that the song we sing is that of Christ crucified, songs through which we sing of the joy that has filled Christians throughout time. When we sing the hymns of our faith, we know that our voices are joined with those in heaven in one praise of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

The Women Of Grace (formerly LWML) will be collecting school supplies again this year to send to areas in need. In 2017, 214,490 school kits were sent to 15 different countries. These families often need to choose between a meal or buying supplies for school. If they don't have the supplies they need, they often cannot attend school. Grace Lutheran has an ingathering every year to collect kits from area churches. These kits are loaded onto a truck and shipped to one of LWR's warehouses in Minnesota or Maryland. Here they are sorted, checked and repacked for efficient shipping. LWR staff work with partners overseas to determine where and what items are most needed. Once prepared for shipment, they travel by ocean freight to the receiving partner in countries around the world. Here they are cleared through customs, and transferred to storage until they can be distributed according to local needs. Much care and effort goes into each kit to ensure it arrives to the intended recipient in good shape.

Supplies needed for each kit include:

- 4- 70 count notebooks
  1-ruler (with cm or cm and inches)
  1-pencil sharpener
  1-blunt tip 5 inch scissors
  5-pencils
  5- ball point pens
  1-pink eraser
  1-box crayons
- 1-drawstring backpack (14inx17in)



Thank you in advance for all you do to make this possible. Our goal this year is 75+ kits from Grace.

If anyone is interested in sewing backpacks for these kits, I can supply you with the cut fabric and instructions to make them.
